On behalf of my committee, I submit the following report of our activities for 1979/80.

1. WORLD COMMUNITY SERVICE - IPAC

We continue to sponsor four orphan Indonesian children. Discussion with Captain Craig. of Salvation Army (who has visited the orphanage)told of how much the children gain from and appreciate our sponsorship, and I believe, confirm that this project is a must for all future boards.

In conjunction with the Sandford Girl Guides, toys made by the Guides were sent to a Salvation Army Hospital and School in Mount Hagon, N.G. On the Club's behalf, I have thanked Captain Craig for her help and Quidance with this project.

The assistance for Leprosy Patient in P.N.G. and Indonesia is the only outstanding project for the year's programme. On medical advice, it was decided not to send Sandals as proposed by the previous Committee, but instead to supply drugs to assist with the treatment of the diseases.

F.A.I.M.

Once again, we successfully persuaded all our members and their wives to become members of F.A.I.M. for twelve months. Our club also boast two life members of this project.

Rotarian Noel Jacobs leaves for P.N.G. on July 18th to assist in completing a building project at Rihona in the Ronu Valley, under the banner of F.A.I.M., Congratulations Noel, it is Rotarians like you who make our wonderful world of Rotary International work so well.

ROTARY FOUNDATION

Group Study Exchange. Our club had the pleasure of hosting the Study Group from North Carolina for two days, taking them to points of interest in and around Hobart. I am sure that all who took part in this exercise will agree that a good time was had by all. Special thanks to Rotarian Ian Dickenson for his co-operation and assistance.

The fines sessions held at our regular weekly meetings raised a sum of \$320 for Rotary Foundation. Our total contribution to the Foundation this year is \$390 which gives us a 400% status.

MATCHED CLUBS

We have continued our matched twin with the Rotary Club of Otjiworonga, S.W.A. and your committee have sent to the above club a book on Tasmania, we are still awaiting a reply.

Sheila was taken to Launceston by Roger Calvert, to attend a student "get together" and I had the pleasure of her company, together with that of three students from the north to a student conference at Longford.

Sheila also had a trip around a large part of Northern Australia for some weeks, with other exchange students.

Your committee once again conducted, in conjunction with Rosny College, a crash course in Japanese, for students going to that country this year. This course is designed to reduce the cultural "shock" and assist with the language problem. All students commented on how much they enjoyed the course.

Our thanks go to Barrie Muir and in particular Bronwyn Phillips of Rosny for their assistance and dedication. A bouquet of flowers was presented to Teacher Bronwyn on your behalf.

Your committee had Barrie Muir speak to our club, re Rosny students visit to Noumea, he is going back this year and I'm sure will further cement links between that country and ours.

To me, this has been a full, satisfying and rewarding year, we have broken and are still breaking new ground. I see no reason why we should not continue to expand our activities in promoting international understanding through the Rotary movement,

WORK EXPERIENCE PROGRAMME

During September 22 Students from Clarence High School were given two days work experience by members of the Club. This was the first time our club and Clarence High School had participated in such a scheme. The response from students and the school was so enthusiastic that already a similar project is planned for August this year and club members have indicated acceptance of thirty students.

SUPPORT FOR YOUNG PEOPLE SEEKING EMPLOYMENT

This project was held at Rosny College of October 24th. A panel of experts from the department of Social Security, Commonwealth Employment Service, Legal Aid Service and various local Government Youth support schemes were present to talk to and advise young people on the assistance that is available to them when they leave school and enter the job market. Although well publicised by all High Schools on the Eastern Shore, the response was very disappointing.

VOCATIONAL SERVICE WEEK

A film "Employing Handicapped People" was shown at our regular club meeting to highlight this week. During the year members have given short job talks at regular meetings.

YOUTH NIGHT

During December the Howrah and Bellerive Clubs together sponsored a Youth Night at the Shoreline Hotel. The speaker was Walter Dickman and his subject for the evening was "How to make the next five years the Best Years of Your Life". Some 270 people were present with a large proportion being young people, who were guests of Rotary.
