CLUB SERVICE DIRECTOR'S REPORT FOR YEAR 1981/82

Club Service covers a fairly wide spectrum of Club activity. To dwell too long on what we planned to do compared with what we achieved would take too long for a report such as this. I would rather encapsule in respect of each sub-committee what was actually achieved and leave to others the judgment as to whether we did well or not.

Attendance: (Ch.) Bob Jones

Persistent attention was paid to reminding members of their attendance obligations with a generally good result. However, Bob's efforts were hampered somewhat by the drop-off in attendance at anything but the conventional Thursday night meet, a fact which I have commented on in other places.

Classification/Membership Development: (Joint Ch.) Tony Stacey & Derek Steele

These subcommittees operated as a joint enterprise and in operating thus showed great enterprise. First in finding suitable members without seeking members for the sake of numbers only. Membership now stands at 42 plus 1 honorary member. Second in finding classifications which would permit for example four 'doctors' with quite divergent classifications.

Public Relations: (Ch.) Trevor Leo

This year our public relations has been better than ever.

Bulletin: (Ch.) John Cotterell

The Bulletin has had its moments. However, spurred on by the critical reader it is expected to attain even greater (?) heights.

Programme: (Ch.) John Frazer

For most of the year the programme has been controlled by one of the newer members, John Frazer. I repeat what I said in the half-yearly report the programme has been varied, interesting and a credit to the effort put into making it so.

Rotary Information: (Ch) Max Dunstone

The dissemination of information has been tried in novel ways this year, for example, the debate on the Four Way Test. This type of approach seems much more successful and thought provoking than older more traditional methods.

Fellowship: (Ch.) John Anderson

A number of functions such as the Christmas ferry dance, cray bake, games night and theatre evening were held. Each was a resounding success due to the efforts of the organisers.

One problem that faces every fellowship committee is how to get more than a 50% attendance from Club members. It must in some way be allied to the problem noted in relation to attendance.

Art Show: (Ch.) Alan Bell

This year, under the auspices of its perennial chairman, the art show really paid off in form of a high class exhibition, which was a credit to the Club and more particularly the organisers. In addition it made a significant contribution to service funds.

Auction \$5,000: (Ch.) Abel Reeve

The object of this committee was to raise an amount of \$5,000 or more to replace the money raised by the auction, and subsequently used to purchase a guide dog.

There were two basic problems. First, the Club in general felt that in the first half year it already had enough on its hands with other Club activities. Second, in the second half year those ideas which it seemed fruitful to pursue were pre-empted by others before they had time to get off the ground.

In the event the success of smaller fund-raising ventures such as the manure sales were such that the service fund carry forward into next year will be very healty.

Country Fair: (Ch.) Graeme Farrell

The, by now traditional, country fair was held for the first time before Christmas, and despire inclement weather more than justified Graeme's faith in a date change. It was a resounding success and proved again to be somewhat of a 'social' occasion as well.

Club Property & History:

During the year the Club appointed Eric Meagher P.H.F. to the positions of archivist, historian and club property officer. Eric has zealously got the Club's property into good shape and his efforts are appreciated.

Appreciation:

I am greatly appreciative of the efforts of all sub-committee chairman and their committee members during the course of the year. Often they may have thought that they had thankless tasks, but the enthusiasm with which they carried them out is largely responsible for the Club's continuing and growing success.

INTERNATIONAL SERVICE REPORT - JUNE 1982

International Youth Projects

The highlight of the year has been the club's sponsorship of Howrah girl Louise Morris as an exchange student to Japan for twelve months from January 1982 and our hosting of Naoko Uchiyama for the same period from March of this year. This student exchange highlights the internationality of the Rotary movement.

The club provided a prize for a student at Rosny College "who showed outstanding proficiency in more than one foreign language. This was won by our exchange student, Louise Morris.

Rotary Foundation

The year has been highlighted by the awarding of a Paul Harris fellowship to Rotarian Eric Meagher for his long and distinguished contribution to the club and the community in general.

Also during the year the club reached the 800% plateau for Rotary foundation. This level of contribution is well above the state average.

World Community Service

The club now sponsors twelve Indonesian orphans through the Salvation Army, which enables these children to receive a secondary education which otherwise would have been denied them.

Almost 50% of club members are life members of F.A.I.M., and many others made their annual contributions on behalf of their wives and themselves.

Rotarian Jacob George established a personal contact between our club and the Rotary Club of Kottayam in South India, however it seemed inappropriate for us to make a financial contribution to their club program.

The past year has been an interesting and rewarding one for the International Service Committee and I would like to thank each member for his contribution to the year's success.

1. Job Talks.

3. Facing Lifes Problems. (Panel of Students.)

A most interesting and informative discussion was arranged with four Students selected from the Rokeby and Clarence High Schools. They discussed freely with members their problems facing them now and the problems they face when they finish their schooling. Many questions were asked by members at the conclusion of the meeting. Because of the interest in this subject the meeting finishing time was extended by three quarters of an hour. I am sure a similar programme could be conducted in the next Rotary Year.

4. Four Way Test.

The Club conducted a debate between members on wather the Four Way Test applied to us in todays life style. This proved to be extremely informative and sometimes amusing evening. All members however did gain a lot from it.

Comments: Several proposed functions had to be cancelled due to the availability of times at evening meetings. Our Club Programme Director became so efficient at his job that evenings were booked out well in advance. The Committee also suffered from the resignation of Rotarian David Hudson and John Novy early in the year, and this did curtail some of the planned activities. However I believe that this committee did have a successful Rotary Year and I would like to thank the Members of my committee for their support.
