The Mortyn Park project is drawing to a close, but the exercise track may well be a means by which to continue our interest in this field.

Of primary importance to this Club is fellowship and I believe that has been maintained at the usual high standard. The Sergeant at Arms is an important key to this success at our dinner meetings. A broad range of service activities and a rich social programme organised over the year, have provided members with many diverse opportunities of participating in Rotary events.

Howrah's contribution to the IPAC Funds for Indonesian orphans is very high and has drawn a special 'Thank you' from the International Organisers.

1985/86 COMMUNITY SERVICE REPORT

A range of activities were undertaken in 1985/86, but the 'Fish For Fun' Project represented a very dominant effort in the year's effort.

'Fish For Fun' resulted in a payment of \$9175.00 to the David Collins Leukaemia Foundation from which \$7175.00 was required to pay for the major prize, a motor car. Thus, the Foundation benefited to the extent of \$2000.00. This result was seriously affected by exceptionally bad weather on the fishing day, which was most unfortunate in view of the very large effort contributed by all concerned. Thanks to the organising committee for their support, but a greater club effort would be necessary to ensure success if we conduct it again.

Support for the Lillian Martin Home continued with the renovation of their laundry and the annual wood chop, which provides so much good fellowship.

Improvements for Mortyn Park continued with the provision of seats, garbage recepticals, wood chips under the play equipment and a sign proclaiming our contribution. This project is now virtually completed and the development of an exercise track is being considered as the next ongoing project of this nature. This is recommended to the incoming Committee.

Prizes were funded for all schools in our area to the value of approximately \$40.00 each.

Collection and sale of fowl manure has been continued this year as a money raiser, but sales are becoming more difficult with the competition from numerous other suppliers. This activity has been a valuable support in past years and always provides excellent fellowship and entertainment.

Apple sales organised recently, provided some much needed funds and from the experience obtained, may be capable of substantial improvement in future.

The camp for underprivileged children was run again and ably organised by a very dedicated John Drinkwater. Although not very well supported by club members, this activity provides a very welcome service and should be maintained in future.

A quantity of books were purchased for the John Paul School at Rokeby.

Continued support was provided for the Christian Care Group at Rokeby with the purchase of a quantity of shoes.

An active year was enjoyed and support from members was much appreciated. Special thanks to Noel Jacobs for support during the year.
