President Report for the 1989/90 Year

A review of the Clubs summary of plans and objectives prepared at the beginning of the year reveals that while only one or two items were not achieved the Club undertook many additional tasks. By any measurement I believe we have had a successful year having participated in most of our traditional activities, broken new ground and handled more money.

Rotary Clubs run a great risk in losing members by expecting a greater participation than the member is prepared to give. With this in mind the directors have supported me throughout the year in controlling the committment given on behalf of members to a level that could be handled by the members available. We will finish the year with 31 members after introducing Michael Longbottom into the Club.

Before going into the highlights of the year I wish to record the saddest event of the year, the passing on of Honorary member Gary Powell. Gary was a Charter Member of the Club and gave us great service during our formative years. Poor health caused his retirement but as an honorary member Gary visited the Club from time to time.

At the time of writing we have had over 20 guest speakers from outside Rotary visit the Club as well as speakers such as RYPEN delegates, exchange students and other rotary awardees. Very few of our weekly meetings have been less than active and full of information. Perhaps one of the most important parts of Rotary is the weekly meeting for both social activity and communications with each other for the purpose of achieving our goals. The degree to which we enjoy the weekly meeting is my indicator of the success or otherwise of the Club and I am of the opinion that all of our meetings for the year have been enjoyable. I would firstly thank Bob Jones for this. In his capacity of Sgt of Arms he has allowed members the freedom of self expression while maintaining order as has Alan Morriss when called on to stand in. Others who regularly contribute to the atmosphere of the meeting are Keith Butterworth and Peter Pitney and I thank them for their contributions.

As well as the regular weekly meeting we have had three ladies nights to date with another planned before the end of the year. These nights are special and are made successful by the extra effort on the part of people like Hank Bouman with such things as the arrangement with the Hotel, flowers for guests etc and of course Lindsay Chivers with the organisation of the Quiz night.

The years programme in retrospect appears to be fairly evenly divided between work and play but at times during the year seemed to be very heavily weighted in the direction of work. The new fund raiser of catering to visitors at the open days of Government House probably gave this impression. As it turned out we enjoyed ourselves doing it and may well find the exercise a top money spinner under favourable conditions. We are thankful to Syd McClymont for making this opportunity available and by the way congratulations on election to D.G. for 1991/92 and of course Peter Chew who lead us through the nightmare. The exercise at Government House also highlighted how much we rely on Noel Jacobs when setting up for the various

fund raising functions. While we have purchased our own BBQ and PA System we rely heavily on Noel for hammer, nail and block of wood to make things work.

The other fund raising activities, the Country Fair and Spin the Wheel, were well organised by Graeme Farrell and George Casinaty respectively with all Club members assisting in particular George Toepfer as M.C at the Regatta to ensure they were successful. It is at these fund raisers that we are so well assisted by members wives and their efforts are much appreciated. The fair provides us with the opportunity of having our annual "working bee" at Terry Morrisby's home which is so well attended I'm convinced our members prefer to dig spuds etc than think. While there are many people to thank in respect of the fair I shall limit myself at this point to acknowledging Terry as mentioned and John Anderson for his efforts with the auctions.

Having covered the high profile business activities of the year, before reporting on the many Rotary activities and social aspects let me now acknowledge some of the members who contribute in a less spectacular manner. The first that comes to mind is Max Dunstone who has been a tower of strength to me during the year by covering every gap that has arisen including backing up the Bulletin Editor, standing in for directors and attending presentations, others who have assisted during the year in this way include Peter Calvert, Ian Cowie, Jacob George, George Gilbert, Fred Hampton & Pim Saarberg all of whom attended everything we organised and were prepared to accept any tasks given.

The Directors of the four avenues of service have provided their own reports and I will not repeat here the details of their activities. Sufficient to say that each has completed a year of activities that has addressed their area of responsibility and ensured that the work of the Club is relevent to the ideals of Rotary. Other members of the Club without the title of director have also had specific tasks and I congratulate them for their efforts throughout the year; these include Laurie Stevens for his accurate recording of members attendance, Ralph Wehse who has captured the year on film, John Drinkwater who with his wife Barbara carried the rest of us through the weekend camp for the underpriviledged kids.

During the year there were many social activities, the tennis day, fishing trips and BBQ and while <u>David</u> Lamb may not have organised them all, he led the committee charged with ensuring we enjoyed major social events like the Christmas Dinner, Theatre night and the coming change over dinner. I am pleased to note that I have not heard any complaints regarding social activities this year and in thanking the social committee I should also include my wife Clare who played a substantial part in the Christmas Party arrangements; as did Father Christmas, but we don't know who played that part.

The portfolios of International Service and Vocational Service appear to need to have split from them some of their activities that relate specifically to youth. Several such activities arose during the year including our successful candidate to the Science Summer School. Richard Wyatt attended to such matters without the aid of an official title. Perhaps a new directorship would be in order. Denis Miller as director of international service undertook his duties to the highest level ensuring the Club was represented in all aspects of this avenue of service. Apart from these normal activities the year has resulted in the gaining of an additional Paul Harris Fellowship to be awarded at the change over dinner and the nomination of a new sustaining member.

One of the most pleasing things to me about my year as President has been the high standard of the Bulletin maintained by Malcolm Salier. The main reason for my pleasure comes from the way we have all been kept informed of Club activities, plans and changes of plans together with a taste of Malcolms particular humour.

When planning the 1989/90 activities and board structure I wanted the balance of newer members and experienced members. Reg Emmett did not hesitate when asked to take on the job of treasurer although it was a new experience for him. Reg had a difficult start to his career in finance but has without doubt handled the job expertly and as so often happens in this club with very little fuss.

In conclusion I wish to acknowledge the support given to me during the year by all members of the Club; all being leaders in their own right, it would be difficult to preside over such a group without that support. I wish Lindsay and his board all the best for the 1990/91 Rotary year and assure him of my full support.

Club Service Director Annual Report 1989/90

Our Club Service Committee this year was made up of its director, Hank Bouman and the directors of the Service Committees: International Service: Dennis Miller: Community Service: Terry Morrisby and Vocational Service: Keith Butterworth.

The monthly board meetings served at the same time as the meetings of the Club Service Committee and were always well attended.

1989/90 developed to be a busy Rotary year with two new fund raising activities, both in the gardens of Government House.

New also was the attempt to hold fireside meetings, recommended by the Governor, made up of groups of six members at the houses of five hosts, who volunteered for this job. Due to several circumstances only two hosts held their meeting. The participants appreciated the experienced fellowship. The attendance of the dinner meeting was reasonable and reached often more than 80%. Once we attained 100% attendance, which was celebrated with a glass of port.

The number of members stayed this year 31: John Burton resigned, but we welcomed a new member Michael Longbottom. Guests and members presented this year to our club 13 banners. Altogether now we have 231 banners, from which 47 are waiting to be sewn on a collective banner.

On the whole our fund raising program has been a financial success with the Annual Fair and Auction, organised by Graham Farrell and John Anderson respectively; the Chocolate Wheel at the Hobart Regatta and at Richmond, with George Casimaty as organisers and the catering for visitors of Government House, with Peter Chew at the helmet. In all these events almost every member was involved. Our dinner program was filled with guest speakers this year organised by the members in their turn. The organising member was also chairman of the meeting in question and was for that reason always well prepared.

The Club bulletin was made up by Malcolm Salier in a very original way: no more words than necessary, neatly laid out with often a photo on the front cover and little drawings inside. Malcolm did so well, that he is allowed to stay editor this coming year, very detrimental to Ralph Wehse, who again will not be sure of the right spelling of his difficult name.

The social events this year were almost professionally organised by David Lamb and his committee. They did a marvellous job with organising our Christmas Dinner in the historical surrounding of the old sandstone house of Derek and Clare Steele; organising also the tuna fishing trip; a successful week-end at the shack of Lindsay and Jean Chivers; the ladies night in the Sakura restaurant with visit to the Post and Telecom Museum and finally our change-over dinner at the Pines, Seven Mile Beach. I also want to mention the woodchop on behalf of the Lillian Martin Home, organised by John Drinkwater and attended by about 12 hard working members. The result was such a large quantity of chopped wood, that till now we are not asked to go for a second time.

VOCATIONAL SERVICE REPORT:

As Director of this portfolio, I am delighted to submit the following report on behalf of my committee. It was only through their skills, knowledge and on-going commitment to develop activities, that Vocational Service was close to realising its full potential.

In keeping with the Marketing Strategy developed at the start of the year, the following overview is submitted for information:-

THE 4 WAY TEST:

The Sergeant-at-Arms implemented the test on an "ad hoc" basis, and it proved a great success in either increasing Rotarians knowledge or alternately was a great fund-raiser for the Club.

CAREER INFORMATION:

This activity was our major focus for the year. In past years it has been Club Policy to attend Rokeby High School and conduct "mock" job interviews.

This year the Committee revamped the concept to create a touch of realism to the project and introduce students to the real world. A cross section of 'Positions Vacant' was obtained from Business Houses and the C.E.P. These positions were then displayed on the School notice board, and students were encouraged to formally apply for the positions. Interviews were then arranged at the various Business Houses, and the students had to present personally for same. The project met with limited success, some of the mitigating circumstances which did not allow the activity to develop its intended purpose, were time constraints and the closeness to exams.

It is the Committees recommendation that if this project is to continue next year, that the incumbents devote more time to developing the concept and allow a greater lead time to implement same.

YOUTH PROJECTS:

The Committee spent a great deal of time and effort in supporting training and development programmes for Youth, and a brief summary is listed below:-

National Science Summer School - We were only one of twelve clubs to have a representative at the school this year.
