#### PROPOSED PROGRAM -> END OF YEAR REPORT - JUNE 2006

Continue to provide monetary support to Rotary Foundation (based on the financial situation of the Club when making decision).

This area fulfilled and several Paul Harris Fellowships awarded: We congratulate the following recipients - Linda Calvert, Harold James and Diane Morriss.

Investigate the possibility of supporting a "SHELTERBOX"

At the 15 June Board Meeting it was moved to purchase one "shelter box" at a cost of \$1200 and contact will be made with Rotary Club of Kings Meadows to work out purchase procedure.

[ShelterBox is the fast growing global Rotary club Project providing on a world wide basis humanitarian aid and relief in the form of material and equipment that provides shelter, warmth and comfort to people displaced by natural and other disasters with each ShelterBox providing shelter for at least 10 people.

Investigate the provision of suitable applicants for Rotary Foundation programs selected by the District: GSE and Ambassadorial Scholarships. Hosting incoming GSE teams.

This area will be pursued further in the 2006-2007 year

Provide financial support to the Indonesian orphans supported under RAWCS (+ Salvation Army) project.

This Project really commenced in a small way in 1964 as a result of a visit by PDG Keith Hopper with his FAIM Team and a Salvation Army Rotarian Cyril Richarde

from the Southport Rotary Club. Cyril was responsible for the project until 1989 when a Salvation Army Rotarian in Nambour, Keith Lipske took it over. PDG Alan Still took over in 1991.

There are now some 470 children / students in the program with 270 sponsors. [The Rotary Cub of Howrah has been involved since the year 1982 - we're approaching 25 years of sponsorship - something of which to be proud]. The students are at Salvation Army Homes in Bali, Java, Sumatra, Sulawesi and Kalimantan besides various Salvation Army Outposts.

This year we have again sponsored five children [Dedy Kristiyawan, Evan Hendranalai, Rendy Zico Sihotang, Martin Triuwan and Nicholas Krispabgki]. We received mail from Martin and Dedy thanking us for our support and wishing us every best wish. At a small cost of \$550.00, I would strongly recommend pursuing this support in the future.

Support FAIM through 'Life Membership' awards to Club membership. Will be pursued further in 2006 – 2007 year

Investigate the possibility of providing applicants and/or financial support to projects undertaken by the District e.g. Friendship Exchange.

Our Club has been involved with quite a few countries. We had 'Friendship Exchange' with Portland Oregon USA in October, Sweden in February, New Zealand in March and we also hosted the Mexican GSE team.

Follow-up of agreement signed with Rotary Club of Tiaong on 22 Aug 2004 – explore the possibility of engaging with this International 'Sister' Club.

This is an area we hope to pursue this further by maybe proposing a group of "Howrah Rotarians" pay them a return visit. We also may try to establish contact with the Rotary Club of San Pablo re a project they wish to pursue re computers in their schools.

Organise a meeting night with an "international" flavour with an appropriate speaker.

This is in hand at the moment as we are pursuing an offer from the Indian Restaurant community

Explore the possibility of an "INTERNATIONAL NIGHT" with a cultural focus and a fun night for the Club.

It is disappointing to report our end result on this occasion left a lot to be desired. The performance of oyster sales was our downfall, and a combination of many factors, competition (more oyster stalls), pricing (purchase price and selling price), the break down of the salamander, the handling of frozen oysters resulted in dumping over 100 dozen and reselling 300 dozen below cost added to the problem of transporting of frozen oysters. Together with the venture into frozen scallops, cutting into our oyster sales, all added to our final wash up. Oyster shooters and salmon sales were negative.

Alan Morris has sourced another oyster supplier; however we have major hurdles to jump before our further involvement.

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For a number of years it has conducted camps at Rotary Commitment to the young citizens of its area.




