Presidents Report

It gives me great pleasure to report on the major activities of the Rotary Club of Howrah for the financial year ended 30 June 2008.

The year under review has, in my opinion been one of much success. It has not however been incident free with the loss of a President, two weeks into the Rotary year and a Treasurer taking extended leave of absence during his term of office.

I do not intend to repeat the details of the reports submitted and attached by the Service Directors. Their reports are clear and precise. I would however, like to thank the following:-

- 1. Kerry Tilyard our **Club** Service Director and President Elect for her dedicated work throughout the year. She started us all off on the right foot with a fund raiser at her home. This money was donated to the Shelter Box appeal.
- 2. **Vocational** Service was well catered for by Cheryl Eyre who provided students for the Summer Science School and other youth activities. An area sadly neglected in recent times was vocational visits which were reinvigorated by Cheryl with a trip to Salmon Ponds and the Clarence Cricket Ground.
- 3. **International** Service was another professionally managed area with Vice President Harold James organising the GSE's from California and India. He has also continued the support of the Indonesian orphans. I will always be indebted to Harold for his never ending support in my role as President. If ever I needed help, he was there.
- 4. **Community** Service was another very successful section of the Club which has provided invaluable service to the local community. Reg Emmett has been very effective in this position with further work on the track and park in Tranmere together with a concrete slab at Seven Mile Beach. His efforts with Bowel Scan are worthy of special mention. This is an important community project which has been proved to save lives.

Membership of the Club has grown steadily from 23 to 26 members and I hope this growth continues. The Club has donated \$2000 to the Rotary Foundation, \$2000 to the Rotary Health Research Fund; three (3) shelter boxes and \$300 to Little Footprints to assist with premmie babies. These are but a few of the areas we have supported and you may find the others in the Directors reports.

We have all enjoyed a number of diverse social activities with not only Cheryl's visits to Clarence Cricket Ground and Salmon Ponds, but also the Waterfront Hotel on two occasions and Venus Restaurant when the Academy was unavailable.

One standout this year has been the diverse range of guest speakers so professionally organised by Dick Shoobridge. I am sure that every member of the club joins with me in expressing our appreciation to Dick for his untiring efforts.

The Club gains profit each week from the raffle and John Drinkwater never fails in ensuring that the raffle is conducted and the prizes organised. Thanks John for your efforts.

A great deal of gratitude is owed to our Sergeants' at Arms, Richard Wyatt and Malcolm Salier for their valiant efforts in raising money each week. The raffle always creates a bit of fun and much needed cash for the Club Account.

Like a true solicitor facing a jury Henk Bouman always produces a very befitting and appreciated summary of the attendance each week. He has promised that at some informal time he will leave his jacket unbuttoned.

I must indicate that without our major fund raisers each year, the Taste of Tasmania; Government House Open Day; the Botanical Garden Tulip Festival; the Jazz Fest; and the Seafarers Festival many of our activities would have to be abolished or severely curtailed. This year has witnessed incredible efforts by Lindsay Chivers, Graeme Farrell and others to ensure our bank balance remains healthy and we can continue with our valuable community activity.

On behalf of the Club I would also like to thank our Secretary Glen Woolley for his effort throughout the year. He is very reluctantly stepping aside as Secretary for the next two years to become Club Service Director and President Elect. His invaluable nine (9) years in the position is worth special mention. His break is only temporary, as he has been promised the job back when he completes his next term in office.

New members have dominated the landscape this year with two new members nearly reaching the 100% attendance achievement. Mal Hatty and Di Ranson have most certainly made an impression on the Club which will be hard for others to follow. My sincere thanks to Di for taking on the responsibilities of the Treasurer at a time when her offer was greatly welcome. Mal has also been hard at work organising our new BBQ trailer which is due for delivery early in the new Rotary year.

Reg Emmett provides the Bulletin week in and week out. He produces a document which is professional and informative. Thanks you Reg for your efforts and also to Annette for she gives to this club more than most realise. Reg is a quiet achiever who appears to pop up everywhere.

Other persons who deserve a special mention and thanks are Alan and Di Morris for organising their most anticipated and enjoyable annual picnic day at Primrose Sands; George Toepher for his support with the school's BBQ trailer; Norm Cooper for lending his mobile freezer; David Lamb and Peter Calvert for all the little but important and often unrecognised tasks they complete each week. These are healthy balances for the 2008/09 Board to commence their projects for the year. I wish Kerry and the 08/09 Board every success in the coming year. A request by members to again subside membership dues has been approved by the Board for 2008/09 but this approval can only continue if the Club account prospers. It costs approximately \$5000 each year to manage the Club.

Finally, I would like to thank the Club as a whole for giving me the opportunity to serve my second term as President. I have enjoyed the experience and hope that the Club has derived benefit from our journey. I know I have.

Community Service Report 2007 - 2008

Reg Emmett, Noel Jacobs, Lindsay Chivers, Norm Cooper, George Toepfer, Mal Hatty Community Service activities were aimed to improve the quality of life within our community. A key component was to continue to foster links with the Community with which we identify.

The following projects were supported

Rotuma Park, Tranmere

Following planning meetings held with residents in the previous year, Council completed landscaping work on this Park. The club circulated residents on our behalf and a tree planting exercise established on 12 August. Around 30 Club Members and residents participated.

Residents were circulated by Council under the Club's auspices to suggest a name for the park. A number of names were suggested and the poll of residents chose *Rotuma* (the name of a brigantine stranded at Droughty Point in 1907.)

A prize will be presented to one of the residents returning a voting sheet at an opening ceremony yet to be scheduled.

Tranmere Foreshore Walkway

Clarence Council staff have welcomed our offer to help facilitate the Clemes Court stage of the walkway. After this is completed we should establish appropriate signage.

Lewis Park 7 Mile Beach,

We established contact with the local Landcare group, an offer for us to `be involved with a renaming ceremony is still available.

Walkway Seats

The Board agreed to finance two walkway seats; their cost would be over \$1000 each. Council officers want to establish a public sponsoring of seats and are keen to have us manage this operation.

Ready Set Go Program

We have been kept in touch with this project and one of our members has been a volunteer with this driver support programme at Rokeby.

Their committee has applied for a Community Support Grant, the result of this application will no doubt govern what further support the group will require.

Bowelscan -

We were allocated four pharmacies and they were all enthusiastic participants and all keen to participate next year. Participation certificates were handed to each, 380 kits were sold with a sample return rate of about 60%.
