MATT COCKER - THE "NEW" HOBART AIRPORT

MATT COCKER ON HOBART AIRPORT Matt has been engaged in the aviation industry for the past 20 years and is the Chief Operating Officer of Hobart Airport. Prior to joining Hobart Airport 9 years ago, Matt held positions within the aviation industry across the country including Adelaide Airport, Northern Territory Airports and Qantas. Matt is on the Australian Airports Association (AAA) National Board of Directors, Chair of the AAA HRREM Committee, and is a member of the Board of the Tourism Industry Council of Tasmania and Business Events Tasmania. Matt has completed tertiary education in business/personnel management and is a graduate of the International Airport Professional (IAP) ACI-ICAS AMPAP program. Prior to moving into the aviation industry Matt was an Officer in the Australian Defence Force and has a law enforcement background. A Tassie boy at heart, having spent many years on Bruny and southern Tas. Hobart Airport was built in 1956, The Government decided that all 'capital' city airports were under a 99y lease. HBA currently under the 'auspices' of Superannuation Funds previously under the Macquarie Bank banner.

2019 Covid interrupted progress at the airport and airfield, but now it's a big work in progress. "Making tomorrow's Tasmania possible" is the current motto being that Hobart is major gateway in Tasmania. Increase in tourism is almost at pre-Covid levels, so the revamp is most urgent.

There are three elements in the plan: Airport upgrade; Terminal expansion and Adjust ground transport facilities. \$400million is about to be invested in those elements , also an urgent factor to maintain Hobart as the 'gateway' to the Antarctic. Defence requirements necessitate the upgrade as well. There is a big push for "Straight To Tassie" tourism. Creating many jobs is also the key to the project and beyond to have the airport functioning well.

The aim is to enable the airport to support wide body aircraft able to fly direct to and from Asia, Hong Kong, NZ and to the Pacific and beyond, including freight. Efforts are being made to entice Singapore Airlines and Cathay Pacific to extend their base to Hobart.

There is a need to strengthen the runway, extend the taxiways, create new taxiways and facilitate closer to terminal parking. For 6 months the runway will be dug up and rebuilt. This will be done in stages to have the least disruption to day-to-day business Much of the work will be done at night. This will create a big increase in the terminal footprint. Pick up and drop off is in the process of being 'fixed'. Front of the terminal is about to embark on a huge revamp. Future terminal layout looks to be double its current size. CT technology and body scanners will be introduced at check-in, helping to make a better passenger experience with more space, more comfort and more retail and food outlets.

Airbridges WILL NOT be a part of the "new airport" plan, the terminal is only a single storey facility, airlines do not want them here as the cost would be another \$400m. But there will be as much cover as possible when boarding a plane. It is a propose 3-year project to be completed in 2027. **Check out:** hobartairport.com.au/tomorrow.
